# Modern US History 3

#### Introduction:

The sophomore Modern US History 3 course is a continuation of studies of US History from freshman year. Our course will begin with the Allied victory in World War II and follow changes in US society, politics, technology and culture occurring at home as well as the foreign policy challenges and decisions made during the Cold War and its aftermath. Students will hone reading skills, note taking, research and writing as well learning to work within groups to create and defend their beliefs and perspectives. The course will follow closely the headlines of the day and attempt to make sense of these events through the lens of American history.

#### Resources:

We will be using many different resources including a new textbook titled, *United States: History and Geography*, various periodicals (magazines, newspapers, etc), and the internet. Your notebook will also become a valuable resource and I will provide all the note paper you need. You <u>must</u> bring a 3-ring binder to class every day. This notebook will include all handouts, and notes from readings, lectures, and class discussions. *Students' careful organization will be rewarded with greater success on quizzes and tests, and on <u>bi-annual open-notebook tests</u>.*
